WHY BANJO WAS BORN AT NARRAMBLA



Andrew Barton Paterson was born on 17th February 1864 at Narrambla near Orange, a fact that can be found in most books and internet sites.

This raises the question of why he was born at Narrambla and not at his parents' home at Buckinbah, now Yeoval.

The story begins with the marriage of his parents, Andrew Bogle Paterson and Rose Isabella Barton, in April 1863 at Rose's home, Boree Nyrang near Molong. It was here that the newlyweds lived and worked on their property despite the

isolation from other people

Rose's mother Emily Barton went to live with Andrew and Rose after her husband Robert Barton died suddenly on 4th October 1863 at the Australian Club in Sydney from a chest infection.

At that time there was a great deal of unrest in the area due to the activity of bushrangers. Rose's brother had been involved at the Campbell's farm around the time of the

gold escort robbery at Eugowra in 1862 by Frank Gardiner, Ben Hall, Johnny Gilbert and John O'Meally.

Emily was concerned about the remoteness of Buckinbah and the lack of medical assistance, particularly for an 18-year-old having her first baby. So she wrote to her sister Rose Templer, asking if her daughter could have the delivery of her first child at their home.

Narrambla was a property of 1,920 acres with a busy flour mill, dairy and cheese factory, wheat growing, a blacksmith and wheelwright. In all there were about 33 families living and working on Narrambla.

The week before the baby's due date, Andrew travelled with a very heavily pregnant Rose in a buggy over rough dirt and gravel roads in the heat of February. They stayed overnight with their friends, John Smith at Gamboola just out of Molong.

From all accounts, the birth was uncomplicated. A few days later Andrew's father rode into Orange and registered the birth of "Baby Paterson." On 11th March the local Anglican priest, Reverend Robert Mayne baptised Andrew at Narrambla.

It was some 80 years later that Richard Sheraton, the clerk at the Orange Court House, noticed the entry of "Baby Paterson" in the records of the birth

registry. He thought that the date was "about right," so he sought out the records at the local church, Holy Trinity in Byng Street, to find that the baptism record was indeed that of Andrew Barton Paterson. These records are available on display in the church. Mr Sheraton then contacted the Registrar of Births, Deaths and Marriages about his find and the records were corrected.

John worked on this project for many years, providing photographs and glass plates. He was immensely proud of his family. There are several items donated by his family on display throughout the museum.

John Edmund Pocknall was born at "Woodvale" Pinecliffe in 1950, the son of Ivan and Ruth Pocknall (Ruth passing away in 2022 aged 99). John leaves his former wife Sandra Hestedt, his children Amanda and Matthew. He was a devoted Grandfather and great grandfather to their children, frequently bringing them to the museum. John was the older brother to Peter and Mark (both deceased), Julie and Patricia.

ERIC JOHN SHIELDS (Queen's Council)

Recently we had a visit from Dimity Pollard, who donated a book, given as a prize to her father when he was Dux of Molong Central in 1938.



Eric John Shields spent his childhood in Molong where his father, Eric William Shields, was Headmaster of Molong Central School. Eric preferred to be known as John, to avoid confusion with his

father. John excelled at school

and was Dux of Molong in 1938, where he was awarded a book prize. He also excelled at the piano. He attended Canterbury Boys

High, then Sydney University where he graduated in 1948, with a Bachelor of Law.

John worked for the Public Trustee Office, before moving to Condobolin where he practiced for 11 years. John married Margaret

Ludowici and the family moved to Sydney. In 1971, he was appointed a Public Defender for NSW. John married Beryl Gapes. In 1976, John was commissioned as a queen's counsel and senior public defender for NSW. He retired in 1985. John passed away in 2016 and is buried at Wentworth Falls.

SHIELD'S LANE

We have been asked many times "How did Shield's Lane get its name'. It is not after Eric Shields who was Headmaster of Molong Central School in the 30's. It was named for a early pioneer family of Molong.

Robert Shield was born in England, his father was Thomas Shield of Lincolnshire. Robert married Rebecca Cook in England in 1838. Rebecca was the great grandniece of Captain James Cook who explored Australia in 1770. Robert and Rebecca married in England in 1838, before migrating to Sydney in 1845, spending time in Glebe. They relocated to Molong about 1853. They had eleven children, six born in Molong.

Robert was a carpenter and when he died in 1889, he owned land in Bank St and Shields Lane. He was a member of the first Molong Municipal Council in 1879 and was Mayor in 1882. He was on the Council for five years. Robert was a member of the first Molong P & A Association (Show Society) in 1864. He along with Joseph Morris and Charles Packham, were responsible for establishing the Methodist Church in Molong.

Robert died in 1889 and is buried at Waverley. After Robert's death, Rebecca moved to Forbes with her daughter and died in 1902.







BLACK'S MILL WHISTLE

Who can remember checking their watches by the Black's Mill whistle that rang out daily in Molong?

Black's Mill was situated on the block that the Motel is on. The Motel reception is part of the original buildings. The Mill itself was where the caravan park is now. In

the early 1940's, the lunchtime whistle was operated by Rainee Gilleland, whose father, David Gilleland was a manager at that time.



Recently Judy Thorn (granddaughter of David) and niece of Rainee was in Molong researching her family's connection with the Mill. Judy and her partner Jim met up with John Black (Grandson of John Black, owner of the mill) at the museum.





David Gilleland worked as head miller at Black's Mill, his family resided in a cottage on the Mill grounds, until the mill burnt down in 1945. They then moved to Sydney.

Marie Hammond remembers the last day of the mill in March 1945:

One Saturday we had just sat down to lunch suddenly there was a loud hooter



and siren sounding. Running to the verandah we could see smoke bellowing. Dad jumped in car, followed by me. At the scene the mill was well alight and men running around some putting hoses into the creek. A sad day for Molong as several lost jobs, lost of

main industry and economy income for the town.

His mother Thora was one of the ten daughters of Felix and Catherine Benson. Felix was the son of John Benson an early pioneer of Molong who arrived here in 1858 as a police officer. John Benson would serve as rate collector, lock up keeper

and bailiff . Felix ran a carting business and at one stage lived in the "Yarn Market" in Bank Street. So lovely to have some connection with descendants of early Molong.

FAIRBRIDGE UPDATE

(From "Follow The Founder" Newsletter November 2023) OFA'S AGM will be held in Penrith on Saturday 10th March. For discussion is the future of the bi-annual reunion at Molong. As members are getting older there are issues with age and ability to travel as well as increased costs.

Work has been commenced at the Children's Park in conjunction with Cabonne Council. Despite the Council having other town priorities , they continue to maintain the lawns. Restoration work by "Transport of NSW" will start early this year. This includes excavation of the ingress and internal road packing down and resurfacing with asphalt. They will repack the Memorial with road base and replace garbage bins.

AUSTRALIA DAY



Records of celebrations on 26 January date back to 1808, with the first official celebration of the formation of New South Wales held in 1818. It was not until 1935 that all Australian states and territories

adopted use of the term "Australia Day" to mark the date of the 1788 landing of the First Fleet at Sydney Cove and it was not until 1994 that 26 January was consistently marked by a public holiday on that day by all states and territories.

There was no official recognition of the colony's anniversary, with the *New South Wales Almanacs* of 1806 and 1808 placing no special significance on 26 January. By 1808 the date was being used by the colony's immigrants, especially the emancipated convicts, to **"celebrate their love of the land they lived in."** *(Kwan, Elizabeth. "Celebrating Australia: A History of Australia Day essay" National Australia Day Council.)*

The chief toast of that occasion was Major George Johnston, who led the officers of the New South Wales Corps in arresting Governor William Bligh on 26 January 1808, in what became known as the "Rum Rebellion."

1818 was the 30th anniversary of the founding of the colony, and Governor Lachlan Macquarie chose to acknowledge the day with the first official celebration. The governor declared that the day would be a holiday for all government workers, and ordered a 30-gun salute at Dawes Point – one for each year that the colony had existed.



In 1837 the first running of what would become the Australia Day regatta was held on Sydney Harbour.

1838 was the 50th anniversary of the founding of the colony and, as part of the celebrations, Australia's first public holiday was declared. The anniversary as a whole was described as a **"day for everyone".** However not all

the colonies agreed and said that it was a Sydney celebration and 26 January was very much a New South Wales celebration.

Prior to 1888 each of the colonies had its own commemoration for its founding. In Tasmania, Regatta Day occurred initially in December to mark the anniversary of the landing of Abel Tasman. South Australia celebrated Proclamation Day on 28 December. Western Australia had its own Foundation Day on 1 June.

The first Australia Day was established in response to Australia's involvement in World War I. In 1915, Ellen "Ellie" Wharton Kirke MBE, née Clements, mother of four servicemen, thought up the idea of a national day.

The 150th anniversary of British settlement in Australia in 1938 was celebrated. However it was also declared as a Day of Mourning by the Aborigines Progressive Association and the Australian Aborigines League as a protest against the "white man's seizure of our country."

It was not until 1946 that the Commonwealth and State governments agreed to unify the celebrations on 26 January as "Australia Day." Since 1988, the year of the Australian Bicentenary, participation in Australia Day has increased, and in 1994 all states and territories began to celebrate a unified public holiday on 26th January – regardless of the day of the week.

The message of the first celebrations somehow has been lost over the years -

"To celebrate their love of the land they lived in."



THE JUMBUCK OF WALTZING MATILDA

According to Sir Norman Kater, a leading sheep industry personality, the word is a corruption of Aboriginal pronunciation. Sheep counted by running through a



chute, usually jump into the air on clearing the gate. According to Sir Norman, the Aboriginals, amused at the way the sheep jumped while being counted, attempted to say "that fellow jump up" but the nearest they could get was "that fellow jumbuck".

The name stuck – and now is part of what almost amounts to Australia's national anthem.

AUSTRALIA'S FLAG

In the 1890's Australia had a flag similar to the White Ensign but with a large blue cross and white stars representing the Southern Cross. A competition to design a flag was conducted by the Federal Government and the winning design was submitted by five people Mrs A. Dorrington (Perth), E.J. Nuttall (Melbourne), I. Evans (Melbourne), Leslie Hawkins (Sydney) and William Stevens (New Zealand). The new flag was flown at Melbourne for the first time on November 3, 1901. It was the same flag that we have today except for some minor changes made to the design in 1909.

Before an Australian flag existed it was usual to fly the British flag at patriotic and formal functions, partly because many Australians were first or second generation British, and partly because it symbolised membership of the Empire. After the Australian flag was designed the practice of flying both flags continued well into this century.

MOLONG IN THE 70's A GLANCE THROUGH OLD FILES A selection of articles found in a 1903 Express that relates to Molong in 1877. From Molong Express Saturday 28th February 1903 (Continued from previous newsletter)

Jan 19, 1877

The town Band is to be established in Molong.

Feb 2, 1877

At a meeting at the School of Arts Committee, it was decided to purchase half an acre of land in Bank Street, as a building site at a cost of £65, half to be paid down and the balance in 12 months. Messrs.' W Tanner, J Haslam and J.M Hughes were appointed Trustees.

On Anniversary Day, a team of Molong cricketers journeyed to Cudal and contrary to expectations won by six wickets. Cudal 27 and 59, O Tapp18. The top scorer. E and M Phillips secured the whole of Cudal's wickets, Molong 47 and 4 wickets for 40, Tempest 17 and 19 was the top scorer.

A man suffering Dt's broke away from a residence at Burrawang on Saturday and turned up at Eurimba the following night. Next day he made it to Brymedura and has made a complete recovery.

Feb 25, 1877

There are 86 pupils on the roll at Molong Public School, with an average daily attendance of 70. Fully 75 percent of children in this district are and have suffering from Ophthalmia (Inflammation of the eye).

A public meeting was held on Monday evening to bring under the notion of the Council of Education "The unsatisfactory and unsecure nature of the wretched old barn used as a public school in Molong.

March 9, 1877

On Monday last the police bought into Molong one John Duncan, whom they arrested in the Bumbury Mountains on suspicion of being concerned in the recent 'Robbery under Arms' at the Coolah Bank. Three men stuck up the manager at the point of their revolvers and after securing £1000 decamped. Constable Healey, late of Molong, found some of the stolen notes on the prisoner, besides a mask, revolver, ammunition, etc.

The rights for the Molong Annual Races raised £50.5s. The Express published the official race card for which a limited number of advertisements were taken.

March 16, 1877

Mr W Tanner yesterday purchased a 700-bushel parcel of wheat at 5s 8d per bushel.

Mr Touzean, chemist has commenced business in Bank St.

The first day's meeting of the Molong Jockey Club was attended by about 400 spectators yesterday.
