As well as having many visitors to the museum, we have received several donations to add to our collection. Here is a few of the various items.





# Biography of James & Agnes SIMPSON

James and Agnes Simpson arrived from Leith, Scotland on 18 September 1839 on the ship "Caledonia". James' father, Robert Simpson worked for 60 years for Mr Hood of "Stoneridge" Eccles Berwickshire. Therefore it was not unusual for the James and Agnes to arrive in Australia with the eldest son of Mr Hood, Thomas Hood. Mr Hood came to Australia with his youngest son, Alexander aboard the "Lady Kennaway" to visit Thomas Hood in 1842 who was then living on the slopes of Mount Canobolas near Orange and with him still was James Simpson. James was often referred to as a close and trusted servant to the family.

James Simpson had married Agnes Scott on 8 April 1839 at Eccles, a daughter of Walter Scott of "Bartlehill". Their first child was Isabella Simpson who was baptised in 1840 in the Canobolas District, James was working as a shepherd.

The children to follow were Robert James baptised in Jun 1842, Margaret baptised in April 1844 and Walter Scott James Simpson baptised in August 1849. Their first grandchild was Christian Agnes born about March 1858 to Isabella Simpson who was living at Copper Hill at the time.

James and Agnes remained in the district eventually living at Market Street, West End, Molong. James died on 28 Sep 1882 at West End age 83 years old. Agnes lived another ten years and died on 1 April 1892 at her residence, West End after a long illness, she was 78 years old, from Drumfries, Scotland.

Both have one headstone in the Molong Presbyterian Cemetery which states it was "Erected

by their loving daughter M. Simpson" The headstone is currently in a damaged state within the cemetery. Margaret Simpson did not marry and died on 11 January 1928 in Sydney and she is buried at Rookwood.

Their son Robert James Simpson (1842-1930) married a widow, Mrs Betsy Ashpole nee Sharp (1847-1939) in about 1878. Robert owned land at Molong and Dulladerry Creek near Manildra which later changed its name to Coates Creek. After this they moved to the Parkes district where Robert pursued work as a miner. Robert and Betsy were to have 10 children mostly all born in the Parkes district. Betsy had previously had six children with her first husband mostly born around Dubbo and the last at Parkes in 1877.

## RED CEDAR

Red cedar was the first timber used for cabinet making in Australia, because of its close grain, softness of texture and ability to take a beautiful polish.

In the very early days this timber was in keen demand not only for furniture, but for doors, window frames and internal panelling of domestic and commercial buildings.

The early cedar cutters were a most unruly race and they were almost locust-like in their attacks on the timber. The Governor therefore in 1827 fixed a royalty of 1/2d. per foot for all cedar cut on Crown Lands. The reason for this royalty primarily was to assist in the cost of keeping order amongst these wild and woolly people. The royalty was also designed to afford some control over the number of trees being destroyed. Unfortunately, the royalty was not very successful from either angle.

In 1871 the Government established a number of forest reserves with the object of preserving cedar and other valuable timbers but by this time there was a very little accessible cedar left in the N.S.W. coastal forests, and unfortunately red cedar is such a slow growing timber that reafforestation of it is not an economic proposition.

# MOLONG IN THE 70's A GLANCE THROUGH OLD FILES

A selection of articles found in a 1903 Express that relates to Molong in 1877.

From Molong Express Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> April 1903 (Continued from previous newsletter)

OCTOBER 26, 1877, A tea meeting was held in the Wesleyan Church grounds on Friday last to raise funds to defray costs of the fencing and palisading around the Church. The attendance numbered about 200.

A good record in the way of extravagance was reported in town this week. An employee on Cliff's Breeza Station left on Saturday with a £70.0.0 cheque and died on the following Thursday with £40.0.0 grog score against him. That publican should be wiped out.

<u>DECEMBER 14, 1877</u>, A biped named Bonnock left his wife ill in bed on Monday and did not return home for 8 days. The wife was found, five days after he left, in a delirious condition and her infant was all flyblown and emaciated. Fifty lashes would do that libel on humanity a deal of good.
