#### Blackberrying at Mount Canobolas

Some years we would take a day off from fruit work - load the Chev Truck up with buckets and billies, people and food, sling a water bag underneath, and off we would go! We had comfy seats utilising "gin cases" - strong bushel cases, sometimes used for packing pears or apples - with cushions in them. Father had attached shoulder high rails so we wouldn't fall out. And off we would go - family, relatives and friends.

It was approximately an hour's travelling to our destination: the fresh water spring on the western slope of Mount Canobolas. On arrival we would head off with billies and buckets to locate the best patch to pick the luscious black berries. Water from the spring ran through a culvert under the road and continued down the paddock into the creek. The blackberry vines crowded the creek banks, having ready supply of water. The berries were big, shiny and plentiful - but difficult to reach! However, with the aid of a pair of secateurs, and sometimes a ladder, a fair share of berries could be reached.

Then back to the truck for lunch - and to compare who had the most, and biggest berries - and maybe the most prickles! Lunch over and back to the task. On one of these excursions my fiancé and brother were standing by the spring overlooking the culvert when a red belly black snake appeared. We threw some stones at it, and then it disappeared down the culvert, luckily, never to be seen again.

Come 3pm and we assembled at the truck for afternoon tea. Folk were satisfied they had sufficient berries, plus scratches, so loaded up and headed for home.

Tomorrow there would be jam to make!

#### PACKHAM PHOTOGRAPHS

Barbara Higginson, the Packham Family Historian, left two framed portraits to be donated to the Molong Museum. These were delivered by Therese Baker and her family.

The portraits were of Charles Henry Packham and his wife Mary Robards, who lived at "Little Quickbourne" until Charles bought the land known as "Cherry Hill" near Molong. They then bought "Clifton" where Charles developed a variety of pears that are known a "Packham Triumph.





#### BOARDMAN GRAPE BOX

In early May, we were contacted about a small grape box that may be of interest to us. Ray New of Forbes donated this grape box owned by AA Boardman of Molong.

Arthur Arnold Boardman born in 1876 and married Hannah Bennett. They lived at Pinecliffe and raised seven children. His vineyard at Pinecliff was founded when Arthur returned with a dray full of cutting after pruning a neighbors grapes. Their vines were irrigated by gravity from the dam on the property.

According to his daughter Lillian New, he had to dive into the dam to turn the water on. The vineyard eventually ceased production because the water became too salty. The grapes were sent to Sydney to be sold. If the agents had any left, they would dump them into the sea.

Arthur died February 1948. The local paper reported he shot himself at Melrose Farm where he had been living with his son Arthur.


### FIRST POSTAGE STAMPS

It may not be generally known, although it should be, that New South Wales has the honor of being the first country in the whole world to use postage stamps. In 1837 on Rowland Hill's recommendation, a parliamentary committee in Great Britain had reported in favour of stamped covers or envelopes. A copy of this recommendation reached Sydney in due course, and the then postmaster, Mr Raymond recommended its adoption in New

South Wales. The Governor approved this on November 14, 1838, and in the "Gazette" informed the citizen "that stamped envelopes could be obtained at 1s 3d per dozen." It was not until February 1840, that Great Britain brought into use the postage stamp system. If anyone to-day could unearth one of these original stamped envelopes, he would find it more profitable than backing the winner of the Melbourne Cup – Observer.

## MOLONG IN THE 70's A GLANCE THROUGH OLD FILES

A selection of articles found in a 1903 Express that relates to Molong in 1877.

#### From Molong Express Saturday 14th March 1903

May 25, 1877, Mr. Joe Black of Bathurst has entered into negotiations for the purchase of a site for a flour mill in Molong. The present mill is full to overflowing with wheat and most of the buildings of local buyers are in a similar predicament, although Mr. Black has signified his intention of setting up as a miller here would nevertheless be will for the question of a Co-operative Flour Mill to be discussed.

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PUBLIC NOTICE –John McGroder notified that he has purchased the plant and goodwill of W. Tanner's chaff cutting business and although hay is being sent from Molong to the Bogan, customers need not be alarmed as the advertiser has secured one hundred tons of the best hay in the district.

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The first annual picnic in connection with the establishment of the "Pride of the West" Lodge of the M.U. Oddfellows was interfered by rain yesterday.

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DEMISE-Mr. F Milgate, of Bell River, aged 56 years.

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June 1st 1877 Snow fell in Molong on Monday last.

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Mr. Black has finally decided upon erecting a mill with three pairs of stones in Molong and a corner allotment facing the rivulet operations will be commenced immediately.

This year the quality of blankets handed out to the Aboriginals was very poor. There was also a decrease in the number of applicants and from signs it is evident that blankets will shortly cease to be given away altogether.

June 8th, 1877, at a meeting of some eighty townspeople, held on Monday last, to consider the question of rail extension to Molong, Mr. Haslam said, "INTER ALIA: The revenue paid into the local Court House in two years would be sufficient to build the branch line Orange to Molong. Moreover, let us tell the Government plainly that if they don't make the line, we want permission to do it ourselves-and make a good thing out of it too. (loud cheers) Mr. John Smith, of Gamboola, also held the opinion and spoke as it was willing not only to take a share, but a very large share, too. (Hear, hear, and cheers).

## RESEARCH REQUESTS

The Research team has had several inquiries that readers may be able to assist with.

A daughter is looking for information on a motorcycle accident near Copper Hill in 1960, when a ex-Fairbridge boy (passenger) was killed. Her father was the rider and he passed away recently. She knows little and would like to learn more. Can anyone help, contact the editor.

A gentleman is looking for information on his Great Grandparents John William Smith and Emmaline Bowler who lived in Orange and Molong. They owned the Orange Royal Hotel and moved over to the Club House Hotel . They also built Emmaville cottage named after Emmaline, now restored .In Molong they are listed as Licensees of the Free Mason Hotel between 1871 & 75.

There have been several members of the Bowler family visiting Molong, Orange and Millthorpe recently. They have spent time at the Yarn Market which is celebrating their 50th birthday. The Yarn Market was originally owned by the Bowler's.

A repeat request for any information on the Museum Building and history of the Society wanted. Do you know of any special occasions or visitors to the museum? Please let us know.

#### DIFFERENT HISTORY from Elizabeth A little bit of different history to enjoy. .

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Food with high acid content caused some of the lead in the pewter to leach onto the food, causing lead poisoning and death. This happened most often with tomatoes. So for the next 400 years or so, tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Bread was divided according to status. Workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf. The family got the middle, and guests got the top, or "The Upper Crust".

#### Lead cups were used to drink ale or whisky.

The combination would sometimes knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. Someone walking along the road would take them for dead and prepare them for burial. They were laid out on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather around and eat and drink and wait and see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of "Holding a Wake".
