## MR DES SULLIVAN (16/4/1931-29/7/2022) FOUNDATION MEMBER OF THE SOCIETY

Recently Des Sullivan, a foundation member, passed away in Bathurst after a lengthy illness.

Des was informally known as the "Mayor of Molong" for his knowledge and involvement in the village and surrounds. He spent many years in the area and enjoyed a chat and joke, passing his extensive knowledge on. He and Nea, "the love of his life" moved to Bathurst

when their health deteriorated to be closer to their family.

Des spent most of his life in the Molong District, he was the local volunteer ambulance and taxi driver. He was an extremely popular shearing contractor, employing many local blokes as well as a Beekeeper. He was on many local Committees and assisted to establish many of the local services.

In 1964 following a display at the Molong Centenary show, The Apex Club with President Des Sullivan and Norm Bloomfield (Owner of Molong Express), were responsible for forming the Molong Historical Society. Des was President of the steering committee that drew up the constitution etc. Des remained a member of the Society until his death. He held many positions and was made a Life Member in 2012 as well as Patron of the Society. He was involved with maintaining the building and grounds. I am sure he is watching the current rebuilding of the veranda. He had many stories, including the one where he had "a ghost" visit him.

Des' favorite saying was

"Molong is the closest place to heaven - on earth"

He loved this town, district, and the people.

A true Molong legend - we will miss him. Loved the bloke!

## Documents, Artefacts, and People: Encounters at the Molong Historical Museum Researching Fairbridge

When young Germans travel to Australia, they usually stick to the big cities or work on farms as backpackers. Rarely, I would assume, do they come to Molong to visit the local Historical Museum. Aside from the fact that I think more tourists should visit the museum (once it is reopened), I, a German PhD student, had a particular interest in coming here.

Since 2018, I have been researching the British child migration schemes to both Australia and Canada as part of my doctoral studies in history at the LMU University of Munich, Germany. The Fairbridge Society operated an important one of these schemes, with Farm Schools and similar institutions not only in Molong, but also in Pinjarra in Western Australia, in Tasmania, Canada, and Rhodesia (Zimbabwe). A lot of research has been published about the Fairbridge Farm Schools and other child migration schemes. What I hope to contribute with my research is a new focus on child migrants' voices.



My project has two main objectives:

- (1) Making child migrants' voices heard while reflecting on the practical and methodological limits of this endeavour.
- (2) Analysing the role of children's voices within the history of the child migration schemes.

The project wants to contribute to the history of child migration, empire, and childhood as well as to the ongoing academic and social discourse about the representation of children's and other marginalized actors' voices in history.

The historian Rodolph L. Schnell once wrote: "[Historians of childhood] study one of the conspicuous mutes of history". Children, of course, seem mute only to historians. For their contemporaries, children are rarely mute – they talk, they laugh, they sing, and they cry. Such voices, however, are rarely recorded and transformed into archival records. As a result, the history of childhood as an academic field deals primarily with adult actors, with how adults saw and treated children. Using the history of British child migrants as a blueprint, I want to show that it is still possible to listen to children in history. To do so, I analyse "voice" both literally and metaphorically.


My research questions include: What legal weight did child migrants' voices have? Were child migrants' complaints listened to, believed, and acted upon? What rules governed everyday communication? How did child migrants' accent affect their experience? What songs did child migrants sing? When did child migrants write letters, to whom, and under what circumstances? How did child migrants express themselves in non-verbal ways?

Another important part of this research are the archives and memories themselves. I investigate whether and how child migrants' voices were recorded and archived, and how they can be accessed and recovered. I also analyse what role child migrants' and former child migrants' voices play in the public memory of the child migration schemes. I am curious to find out who is writing the history of child migration and shaping the public memory about this part of Australian/British, imperial/local but also, for so many people, deeply personal history.

After spending just a few days in Molong and at the Molong Historical Museum, I was overwhelmed with new insights and realisations. I had access to some very interesting documents and artefacts, which deepened my understanding of everyday life at the Farm School: A Scouts' log and the Junior Farmers' scrapbook revealing

details at the intersection of education and leisure, of daily life and one-time events; an official diary chronicling children's appendix surgeries along side farm work and sports matches; an autographs book telling a story about friendships and poetry.






However, talking to people, who -- in different ways - had a connection to the Farm School, taught me more than any document could. I feel deeply honoured and thankful that these individuals were willing to share their personal memories with me. From these conversations, I learned how growing up as a child migrant at Fairbridge shaped individuals for the rest of their life. I got a better understanding of

why positive or negative memories were shared at certain times and not others. I got an insight into how locals perceived the Farm School and its inhabitants (or "inmates" as some call themselves) and what their perspective is on the current media discourse about child migration and the legacy of the local Farm School.





Last but not least, I learned what a treasure trove Molong has thanks to its Historical Museum and the Molong Historical Society with all its volunteers. Sue in particular was a blessing for me; she was a magnificent host and a huge help. I will forever be grateful.

The museum will be hosting a morning tea and will have a exhibition of items from Fairbridge. We have had several donations recently.




## VERANDA REPAIRS UPDATE

The veranda repairs are moving along and it won't be long before we can enjoy a cuppa and chat there again. The replacement of the floorboards is complete. This was achieved with the assistance of several volunteers who gave their time for several days. The painting is in process and the ironwork is nearly ready to be replaced. This has been cleaned and repainted.



When the floor boards were removed and the area below cleared many treasures were discovered (see photographs of a small selection) These tell a story of life before the Historical Society occupied the building.





Ivy Barrett has offered to contribute a few memories of her childhood growing up in the Molong District in the 30's and 40's. Ivy is 95th birthday and resides at Prunus Lodge.

Molong in the mid thirties had "Late Night Shopping" on Saturday night. Gas lights, Salvation Army and the town band played, stirring up Bank Street. There were movies and a dance in the School of Arts, with local people providing the

music. A bun from the Bakers Shop and a saveloy from Greek Café and sit on the Post Office steps and have a feast and the "Band played on".

At school in year 5, one of my favorite teachers disappeared and showed up dressed in khaki-yes we were at war. This teacher was a straight shot with a piece of chalk if you weren't paying attention.

I continued at school until I was 15 in year 7, then I left. I helped my parents with work on the vineyard. In the offseason I did parttime work at a couple of shops in town -namely W.J Amos Menswear.

Most of the young local men had either joined the forces or had been conscripted. My older brother took on the mail run, our uncle had serviced previously, he was now in khaki. This was the Molong via Peabody Road and back to town via Sandy Creek Road mail run.

Eventually the war ended and some of our boys returned. Sadly most of them did not reach their allotted "three score years and ten" (70) but died early. The survivors picked up their threads of life and carried on.

Meantime our shopping hours changed to Saturday afternoon closing (no more feasts on the Post Office steps). There was no more dances (Community Hall etc.) still growing 'No movies'. Times have changed.

During Covid, Prunus was in lockdown, but we could talk to visitors through the fence. We certainly had a trying time ("We" as the population in general)

We all look forward to Ivy's next contribution.

| <u>June 8th,1877</u> , Obituary; - John Ebbs Leathem, aged 69, father of the proprietors of the Molong Express and for nearly 30 years a member of the staff of the Sydney "Morning Herald"   |
| The tender of Mr. Denning has been accepted for the erection of the School of Arts.   |
| A melancholy event took place out at Meranburn a fortnight ago when Christian Miller lost his oldest son through eating mushrooms, which were said to be poisonous at this time of year, being out of season.   |
| June 15 <sup>th,</sup> 1877 Drought stricken - A gentleman who has just returned from a journey into the interior, informs us that in Bogan country the effects of the drought are very apparent. He asserts that sheep are lying dead in great numbers close to the road and that any person possessing horses, wagon and feed could drive a good trade by taking a circuit of the country. He could also top his load by a few hundred horns of the dead cattle lying in company of the sheep in every direction. |
| Notice: - Cobb & Co's day coach leaves Molong for Orange every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday at 9am. Arrives in Orange at 1.30pm". Booking Office at Mr. F. J Wynne.  |
| June 29 <sup>th</sup> , 1877, Mr. Hull has almost completed his contract for the new R.C Church in Molong. It is intended to hold the consecration service at an early date.  |
| It is proposed to erect a brick C.E building at Beri Creek. The ground has been given by Mr. R.T. Cousins, while subscriptions will be received by Miss E Cousins Bathurst), Mrs A.T Cousins and Mr. W.H Cousins. junr.   |
| W. Tanner notified that owing to the advance in the price of flour the 2lb loaf will in future be 5d.   |
| A store employee carried a bag of flour from Langdon's Mill to Riddell St, a distance of over 100 yards, the other day, without stopping. The feat was an outcome of a bet.   |

<u>July 6, 1877</u>- Mr. Robert Barlow, one of the contractors for the new police barracks at Molong, committed suicide on Sunday last by cutting his throat with a razor. The unfortunate man, who was married, was much worried over his contract and also over the Government. A verdict of suicide whilst Insane was returned at the inquest.
