Golden memories of a tireless volunteer

PRESERVING memories of rural life was a passion for Trevor Pascoe, who tirelessly volunteered his time with the village's historical society which operates the Golden Memories Museum.

Mr Pascoe died suddenly aged 82 in 2012, after being diagnosed with the disease long condition cancer.

His legacy will be preserved with the opening of a new museum pavilion, named in his honour from 1 Lawns, Millthorpe, which will house more than 300 artefacts that changed the face of agriculture in the region.

Entrepreneur Dick Smith AC is bringing an old harvester with his wife to present a plaque during the opening ceremony.

"I'm pro farmer and always look to promote living on the land," he said.

"I had three small country houses, I like so many others, live in a city on the coast and it's great to sit there anywhere below the Great Dividing Range."

Following the ceremony, the museum will be open for tea for the rest of the day.

Millthorpe and District Historical Society secretary Jacki Irvine said it had taken three years to complete the pavilion, with funding from the state government, Harvey State Council and Catta Valley Operations.

"Trevor was instrumental in the process," she said.

The day will also include the launch of the book *The Pascoes: A Family Saga*, a publication on Trevor's family history.

Trevor's sister-in-law Judy Pascoe said he had been working on his family history for at least 40 years before his health deteriorated, causing him to leave the United Kingdom for research.

She helped with double the publishing so the book could be launched on the same day as the pavilion opening.

"He virtually had the book finished," she said.

"It just needed to be typed and that's what we've achieved."

The event will include a barbecue with Devonshire teas and coffee.

Entertainment will be supplied by Jason and Chloe Rowell.

"We hope to raise awareness about our stray animals."

Co-treasurer Laura Ferguson encourages families thinking of buying cats or kittens at Christmas gifts to consider long-term costs and care.

"They are a lifelong commitment," she said.

"Providing socialisation, food, bedding and toys is important."

Millthorpe Rescue is a local registered charity that takes in and cares for stray, injured, unwanted and neglected cats and kittens.

Millthorpe has rescued more than 200 cats since it was established three years ago.
